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State Licensing Basics

Where to start...

Know your company's business model (from manufacturing to the customer)

Check the state requirements for licensure

Look at the regulations for the state (...check the fine print)

Identify your company's activity and product types

Be sure to select the correct licensing application

Note: Just because you are a manufacturer in your home state, don't assume you'll be a manufacturer in every state

Manufacturer Types

Actual Manufacturer - a company that manufactures their own prescription drug products and/or medical devices. Distribution can be by manufacturer or 3PL.

 Licensure currently required in all states, except MA (unless manufacturer located in MA)

Contract Manufacturer - a company that is contracted by another company to manufacture prescription drug products or medical devices for them. A contract manufacturer may also be an actual manufacturer and have their own-labeled products.

Licensure required in 31 states currently - AK, AL, AR, AZ, CT, FL, GA, IA, LA, ME, MI, MN, MS, MT, NC, ND, NH, NJ, OH, OK, OR, PA, SC, SD, TN, TX, UT, VT, WA, WV and WY.

Virtual Manufacturer - a company that sells their own prescription drug products and/or medical devices but outsources the manufacturing and distribution operations. Virtual manufacturers never take possession of the product.

Licensure required in 39 states currently - AK AL, AR, AZ, CT, DC, FL, GA, IA, ID, KS, LA, MD, ME, MI, MN, MS, MT, NC, ND, NH, NJ, NM, NV, NY, OH, OK, OR, PA, PR, SC, SD, TN, TX, UT, VT, WA, WV and WY

State Licensing - Product Types & Activities

State Licensing Product Types:

- Over the Counter (OTC)
- Prescription (RX or aka Legend Drugs)
- Controlled Drug Substances (CDS)
- Listed Chemicals (LC)
- Medical Devices (MDV)

Types of Activities:

- Manufacturing
- Distribution
- Sales/Marketing (NDA/ANDA and labeler)
- Packager/Repacker



Different Entities in Supply Chain

Virtual Manufacturer (VM)
ANDA/NDA Holder

Outsources manufacturing, packaging, and distribution. Conducts the transaction of sale.

Contract Manufacturer (CMO)

Physically manufacturers the product for the VM.

Transfers the product to the CPO or 3PL upon completion.

Contract Packager (CPO)

Physically packages the product for the VM or CMO. Transfers the product to the 3PL.

Third Party Logistics Provider (3PL)

Takes physical possession of the product from the CMO or CPO and handles the distribution to the customer for the VM.

State licenses for selling into a state

SOMS

Contract Manufacturer (CMO)

DEA - 222 forms, Quota, ARCOS, SOMs, Theft/Loss Reporting, YERS and Biennial Inventory

State licenses for manufacturing product

Contract Packager (CPO)

DEA - 222 forms, Quota, ARCOS, SOMs, Theft/Loss Reporting, YERs and Biennial Inventory

State licenses for packaging/repacking products

Third Party Logistics Provider (3PL)

DEA 222 forms, SOMs, Theft/Loss Reporting, YERS

DSCSA - Packing Slips & Bills of Lading

State licenses for distribution of products

Challenges

What license type am I?

- Industry is changing faster than state regulations. Every state is handling VMs, CMOs, CPOs, and 3PLs differently. When in doubt, call and ask. Don't assume.
- More than one type: CMO + Manufacturer of own drugs

Whose DEA registration should I use?

- Quota is obtained by the CMO or CPO.
- While product is in production it is under the CMO or CPOs DEA registration
- VMs never take physical possession of the product and they do not have a DEA registration.
- Upon processing completion, the product is transferred to the 3PLs DEA registration for distribution

Additional Challenges

Am I responsible for making sure my business partners are licensed?

- Some states are holding manufacturers responsible for ensuring the CMOs, CPOs and 3PLs are properly licensed.
- If you are caught doing business with an unlicensed entity, you may be fined.
- Some states require proof of an organizational relationship during licensure and may request copies of the 1st and last page of the contract.
- Some other states require copies of FDA reports including EIRs, 483s and response letters to FDA as part of licensing process
- Where does transfer of ownership of products happen?
